Joan Maloofe is the Founder and Executive Director of the Old-Growth Forest Network. She was a student of plant and environmental science and ecology, and is now a Professor Emeritus at Salisbury University in Maryland. She founded the Old-Growth Forest Network to preserve, protect and promote the country's few remaining stands of oldgrowth forest. She travels widely throughout the region speaking to diverse groups about the values and virtues of these old forests and grandfather trees, which she clearly loves.

Her book "Teaching the Trees: Lessons from the Forest" won an honorable mention from the Association for the Study of Literature and the Environment. Copies of her most recent book, "Among the Ancients: Adventures in the Eastern Old-Growth Forests" will be available at the meeting
