Minutes of the Pocahontas Chapter, VNPS Meeting, January 14, 2016

Welcome: President Leslie Allanson called the meeting to order by welcoming everyone and asking visitors to self introduce. Twenty seven members and eight guests were present.

Announcements: Volunteers are needed for Tuesday LGBG privet removal on January 19 and February 2 at 12:45 p.m.

Members were urged to sign up at the back of the room to help staff "Ecology in Motion" at the Science Museum on Friday, February 19 between 5:00 and 9:00 p.m. where our chapter will have a booth (along with other likeminded organizations) to promote Virginia's native plants. This free interactive and educational event, bringing a spotlight onto ecology, conservation, and native plants is sponsored by the Richmond Ballet.

Dorey Park Sunday Strolls are planned for February 21, and March 13 and 20 at 2 p.m.

The VNPS Winter Workshop at University of Richmond is scheduled for March 12. Our chapter will provide refreshments again. Volunteers were asked to sign up at the back of the room or contact Catharine Tucker.

Program: Catharine Tucker introduced the evening's speaker, Kristi Orcutt. Kristi describes herself as a former bugphobic who took up beekeeping 10 years ago and now dedicates much of her time to teaching and mentoring
beekeepers in central Virginia. After learning about Colony Collapse Disorder (CCD) and discovering that traditional
beekeeping practices involved using fungicides and pesticides inside the hives to control hive pests, she made the
decision to choose another beekeeping management mode – "cide" free beekeeping. To promote natural beekeeping
in central Virginia, she co-founded Rockwood Park Backyard Beekeepers Association in 2009. She also keeps bee
hives at Lewis Ginter Botanical Garden where she serves as a Children's Garden educator and program developer.
Kristi gave a dynamic introduction to the lives of bees that included audience participation making it easier for
everyone to understand what goes on in a hive and the roles of drones, workers, and the queen. She discussed the
threats to bees and her attempts to keep her bees safe and healthy. Although most honey bees are not native, they play
an important role in agriculture in this country. Native bees are important because of role the play in pollinating
native plants; they need each other.

Business Meeting: Due to the lateness of the hour, the business meeting was abbreviated. The minutes from the November meeting (published in December Newsletter) were approved. Treasurer, Richard Moss reported a balance of \$4,639.08. Membership Chair, Dabney Robinson, reported 110 members. Catharine Tucker gave an update on progress of James River Park Invasives Removal Project. The Chapter's February program will feature the professional ecologists who are guiding this program. Suzanne Jenkins urged members to visit VNPS website for updates on state activities, including registering for the Winter Workshop at University of Richmond. The 2016 annual state meeting will be in Blacksburg September 9 – 11 and the 2017 meeting will be co-hosted with Potowmack Chapter and the native plant societies of Maryland and West Virginia at the National Conservation Training Center, Shepherdstown, West Virginia.
