Rebecca Wilson works for the Natural Heritage Division of the Department of Conservation and Recreation and is the Chesapeake Bay regional steward. She is also the prescribed fire leader for the eastern part of Virginia, the manager of 10 area reserves and is a graduate of Mary Washington College with a major in Environmental Science.

She will tell us about the use of proscribed fires to maintain fire adapted ecosystems, in particular the Zuni pine barrens which represents the northern limit for longleaf pines in Virginia.

Botanical Art Workshop: Friday, Oct. 7 - Sunday, Oct. 9

Botanical illustrator Lara Call Gastinger will be conducting a weekend workshop in botanical art at Flower Camp in Buckingham County in October. Creator of illustrations for the Flora of Virginia, Lara will be teaching a form of watercolor painting that is more expressive than technical illustration but equally responsive to botanical detail. Her emphasis is on observing and depicting plants at all stages of their development and on helping participants observe more closely, sketch and paint more accurately. This workshop also includes opportunities for wildflower

identification, informal instruction in basic botany, and guidance in plant collection processes. Participants learn dry brush techniques, color mixing, and how to apply gradual layers of color.

Tuition of \$275 (10% donated to The Flora of Virginia Project) includes instruction, five meals, two nights overnight accommodations, and the inspiration of the Piedmont countryside.

Flower Camp is a retreat center on the James River 30 miles southwest of Charlottesville near Howardsville, Virginia. It offers bunkhouse-style accommodations and delicious, family-style meals.

I really appreciate your consideration and suggestions. - Sally **Recording secretary** - 8 meetings a year, minutes. I would consider a person who would do only the 4 board

meetings.

1st and 2nd VP - these positions require 8 meetings a year, and have few specific obligations, relating to running meetings in the president's absence and signing checks, but are a chance to promote programs the candidate is interested in.

Treasurer - 8 meetings. While Rebecca has agreed to continue, we both feel that it would be good to have a person as backup who could take the position in the future.

Education - 4 meetings, set up annual workshop, review printed materials to be sure they reflect the society's mission and policies, oversee new educational publications

Fund raising - 4 meetings, otherwise like it sounds

Publicity - 4 meetings, develop media contacts to promote VNPS events and programs

Membership - 4 meetings, work with office staff (Karen) to develop and communicate with the membership **Publications** - 4 meetings, oversee the production of the newsletter and keep track of the editor's contract, other publications can be pursued if the candidate is interested

Horticulture - 4 meetings, answer website and telephone questions about what to plant, review and update the nursery list

Director at Large (2) - Advisory type positions and the person can run their own projects if they are interested in

doing so.
